1:30 PM CT Watchu Talkin' 'Bout Willis? Importance of Good Documentation

Whether the goal is to provide evidence for coding and billing services, support medical necessity for a suggested treatment or provide means to communicate with other providers, proper documentation is a must. With the new imposed 21st Century Act, progress notes are no longer just meant for other providers or insurance companies. In this presentation, we will discuss how you can help residents improve their methods of note taking to reduce patient calls and complaints. Furthermore, we will explore the medicolegal aspect of proper documentation and what residents need to know to excel in documenting clinical care. And, to help you increase the chances of your residents becoming board certified surgeons, a representative from the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery will discuss progress note elements considered and reviewed during surgical case review. Information will be shared with you on common weaknesses seen in chart documentation that result in possible failure of ABFAS Case Review.

2:00 PM CT Weird Science: Sim Labs and Virtual Education

Traditionally and prior to Covid-19 pandemic, resident education and training was based on direct hands on and direct patient care model. With advancement in technology, we now have great tools to supplement our way of teaching and education. As a result of held or reduced elective cases, program directors and residents have seen a need to augment current training and surgical skills. Virtual and simulation learning provides another supplementary avenue in helping residents acquire both knowledge and skills. Virtual training gives residents a safe place to practice and hone their skills and knowledge base and to be able to take those skills and knowledge into the direct patient care model that exists. Simulation learning can also provide additional means for residents who need to improve any areas of deficiency. In this session, the program directors will be provided tips and suggestions on how best to utilize alternative options to traditional learning and maximize the training of students and residents.

- 1. Increase awareness of residency directors about virtual and simulation learning opportunities that can be integrated in their residency training curriculum.
- 2. Educate directors on the usefulness of virtual and simulation education and how it can aid in improving the training of the residents.
- 3. Discuss how virtual training can help in remediation of a resident who may need to improve on certain skill sets.
- 4. Present access to broader training that may not be available in your local area.

2:35 PM CT You Wouldn't Like Me When I'm Angry: Resident Remediation

There are challenges and certainly challenging people in every residency program, regardless of type of the program. The goal of the session is to provide guidance and resolution recommendations in managing a resident with personal, academic, or

behavioral obstacles. Personality issues will affect interpersonal relationships with patients and colleagues. Academic deficiencies may result in unsafe care to patients due to inadequate surgical skills or gaps in medical knowledge. Behavioral obstacles such as substance abuse may yield in time management concerns, social media issues, or problems with the law. In this presentation, our expert speaker will provide tips on how to identify a problem resident and will recommend course of actions to help the resident, the faculty and the program director. There will be a discussion among a multi-disciplinary panel to pinpoint appropriate approaches to remediation and resident dismissal.

- 2. Provide guidance on managing a resident with personality issues and inappropriate interactions
- 3. Recognize and correct gaps in a resident's medical/surgical knowledge and provide educational rectification

4:05 PM CT "I've Fallen and I Can't Get Up" - Resident Burnout

Burnout is present amongst residents and attending physicians at a rate of 27-75%, depending on specialty. There are many factors within work, life, and training that contribute to burnout, which can then lead to psychological and physical distress. Such distress can cause physical or mental injury to a resident, as well as inferior patient care. Attendees will learn to describe the prevalence of clinical distress related to residency. As well as identify the differences between burnout and moral injury. Features of burnout can be recognized early to facilitate interventions. Solutions to address both burnout and moral injury within resident(s) and an organization are a group effort. Reconstructing our approach and interventions for burnout may improve resident lives and patient care.

- 3. Discover solutions to address BOTH burnout and moral injury within residency and your organization.
